The summer season is upon us, which means warmer weather and more outdoor time for all. Many people from Frankfort and nearby communities enjoy our Old Plank Road Trail during this time of year. The Frankfort Police Department conducts regular patrols of the trail throughout the day. However, it is important to be safe while walking, bicycle riding, and traveling in vehicles. Below are a few safety tips and reminders for summer time safety.

- Walk in groups or pairs if possible.
- Avoid using your cellular phone while walking.
- Do not walk or run with headphones or ear buds in. If you must, put one in so you can be aware of your surroundings.
- Always look both ways before crossing the street, vehicles may not stop for you.
- Wear bright or reflective clothing if walking, running, or bicycling at night.
- Anticipate and look for pedestrians at designated crosswalks when driving.
- If playground equipment appears to be damaged or unsafe contact the responsible park district.
- Remember to never leave children or a pet in your car. A vehicle's interior temperature rises rapidly and can cause death or serious harm.

# CURRENT CRIME TRENDS

Below are our current crime statistics from January 1<sup>st</sup>- May 1<sup>st</sup> of 2018. Burglaries to Motor Vehicles still remain a crime trend in the Chicagoland Suburbs. This crime is preventable. Remember to always lock your vehicle doors. Never leave car keys or fobs inside of your vehicles and remove valuables from vehicles.

## The Importance of Reporting

At Homeowner's Association meetings, quick exchanges at local businesses, and even at our "Coffee with a Cop" events, we often get asked about reporting crimes or suspicious incidents. Many people are concerned about "bothering" the police. Frankfort Police Officers are on shift 24 hours a day and every day of the year. It is our responsibility and duty to respond to all calls for service. We are grateful for any tips or reports of suspicious activity. There are times a person is the victim of some type of crime, and their neighbor says, "I thought something wasn't right, but didn't call". Call if something doesn't seem right, it is okay if it turns out to be nothing. Another deterrent to calling in criminal or suspicious activity is people not wanting "to get involved". Frankfort is our community. The police cannot be everywhere all the time. As a resident or business owner, you know what is typical in your area. We need you to tell us when something strange or unusual is occurring. We may not know that a certain vehicle does not belong in your neighborhood, but you do. When calling the police, you can request to remain anonymous. This is an excellent option when people fear retribution or "do not want to be involved". Many crimes have been solved or deterred due to citizen's calling in suspicious activity. Recently, a business had a retail theft and our police agency was looking for the suspect. A young resident saw someone suspicious in their yard and called the police. The suspicious person was the suspect and was apprehended due to the resident's quick thinking and reporting. Remember, you can call 911 or report information by calling our non-emergency number at (815)485-2500. Lastly, we do have an anonymous tipping feature on our Nixle information site. 
## **CPA** Graduation
